ADMISSIONS



Registration for the Class of 2023 is in full swing! Following the largest number of Placement Test takers in many, many years this past December, it is expected that this class will be the largest at OA for the 2019-20 school year, surpassing the number of graduating seniors and continuing our overall enrollment growth.

OA works diligently to keep the cost of our high quality, faith-based educational experience as low as possible; but 71% of our families have received some form of tuition assistance just this year alone. The need for these funds continues to grow and fortunately, so do the opportunities for generating this support (see article on 529 plans on page 7). When you support our annual Academy Fund drive, you help to support tuition assistance.

Playing another key role in these awards are numerous "named scholarships" that have been established for both incoming and current students. Over \$64,000 was distributed to 52 students this year as part of this program. That's almost 25% of the student body!

We are so grateful to individuals and families that have established these named funds. Some have specific criterion such as involvement in the fine arts or being the member of a particular parish. Some are in memory of a beloved parent, wife, daughter or teacher. Some are fully endowed; some are still working toward that goal. But they all make an impact and for that, we are truly inspired and humbled.

Here are two wonderful scholarship examples and the incoming freshmen who will be officially honored at this year's Scholarship Ceremony on April 10.

Holly Bruns Memorial Scholarship

Now in its 9th year, this scholarship is awarded to students who "exemplify Holly's spirit and dedication to the mission of OA." Holly was a 1974 ICA grad who continued her education at Marian College. She left her mark as a role model, mentor, leader, educator, coach and competitor. Tragically, she was killed by a drunk driver in 2008. In her estate, she left the beginnings of an endowed scholarship that has been added to every year since through the revenue generated by the Holly Bruns 5K Walk/Run held annually in April.

This year's three recipients are Rhett Martin (St. Mary, Greensburg), Marissa Eckstein (St. Nicholas, Sunman), and Charlie Schebler (St. Louis, Batesville). All are strong student athletes (like Holly). Rhett is known as a true 'team player' by coaches and peers. Rhett's dad, Rodney, worked with Holly as a young PE teacher/coach at South Decatur. Also, Rhett's family are members of Immaculate

Conception Church in Millhousen (where Holly attended). Marissa is very active in volleyball both at school and with the CYO (Holly was a volleyball coach and she started the volleyball program at South Decatur). Charlie has a passion for sports - playing basketball and baseball. (Holly also coached softball). He is recognized by teachers and peers as being a pillar when it comes to the Bully Busting program at St. Louis, taking a firm stand against any type of bullying between students. He is a great student leader on the court/field and off. (Holly was too).

Elmer G. and Rose L. Ramsdell Scholarship

This scholarship was established by Ruth Ramsdell Haas '55 in 2002 in memory of her mother and father. Ruth explains: "My parents greatly valued an education. They were both only able to complete the eighth grade. My father always said that an education was something no one can ever take away from you. My parents encouraged me in my four

years at the Academy, then at Marian College and finally at Fordham University."

This scholarship is given to students who may not be able to attend OA without this added support.

This year's recipients are Ellee Bruns (St. Michael, Brookville) and Jacob Hoff (St. Nicholas, Sunman). Both have been in Catholic schools since kindergarten. Catholic education is very important to their families, just like it was for Ruth's family. Ellee's older sister, Maggie, is a 2016 OA grad; Jacob's brothers, Michael and Nicholas, are at OA now as well as 2 younger siblings at St. Nicholas.

SCHOLASTIC ART AWARDS

Great news! We have several winners in the art category of the Scholastic Art and Writing awards. Only the very best artists and writers earn awards through Scholastic. It is very competitive and we are very proud of this recognition of our student’s work. Over 5,000 pieces were submitted for this year’s competition. Gold Keys are awarded to the top 5-7% of all entries; Silver Keys are awarded to the top 7-10% of all entries; Honorable Mention is awarded to the top 10-15% of all entries. Oldenburg Academy’s students received 2 Gold Key awards, (Anthony Alderson ‘20 and Dorothy Doll ‘22), 1 Silver Key (Anthony Alderson ‘20) and 4 Honorable Mention (Alyssa Krekeler ‘20 (2), Stella Hillenbrand ‘19, Elizabeth Mullen ‘20) art awards at the regional level of the annual competition sponsored by Scholastic.

Over the years, the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards has grown to become the longest-running, most prestigious recognition program for creative teens in the U.S., and the nation’s largest source of scholarships for creative young artists and writers.

GRANTS

OA celebrates the reception of two recent grants that will help strengthen and enhance the learning experience. We are the recipients of a \$7500 grant from the Rising Sun Regional Foundation as part of their last distribution cycle. These funds will be used to help us continue to transform classrooms into "innovation rooms" which are more supportive of technology integration, collaboration, and project-based learning. We are also grateful to The Village Store (owners Jeff and Ellen Dickman Paul '77) whose generous gift will be added to these funds to enable the transformation of 2 classrooms.

"Teenagers today live in a fast-paced, computer driven world. Everything comes to them in a moment, whether it's streaming over the Internet or on the stores' shelves. Students are disconnected from where things come from and how things are made. Printmaking is a chance for students to slow down and learn craftsmanship," states OA art teacher Theresa Murphy. These objectives will now be able to be met by OA art students. Mrs. Murphy recently received a John and Joan Hillenbrand Vision Grant for the purchase of a printing press to be used in classes at OA. Printmaking is a classic art-making technique used to print the earliest Bibles; it was also used by Rembrandt, Durer and many famous Japanese artists. OA students will now have the opportunity to explore the world of this handmade craft that allows them to express their own creativity as they develop this technique.

GRANDPARENTS (AND OTHERS) HAVE A NEW WAY TO SUPPORT THEIR GRANDCHILDREN AT OA

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA) has made some changes to qualified tuition programs ("QTPs," also commonly known as "529 plans"). These changes took effect for 529 plan distributions after 2017. A 529 plan distribution is tax-free if it is used to pay "qualified higher education expenses" of the beneficiary (student). Before the TCJA made these changes, tuition for elementary or secondary schools wasn't a "qualified higher education expense." The TCJA provides that qualified higher education expenses now include expenses for tuition in connection with enrollment or attendance at an elementary or secondary public, private, or religious school.

529 plans are now allowed to distribute up to \$10,000 in expenses per designated beneficiary for tuition incurred during the taxable year. This limitation applies on a per-student basis, rather than a per-account basis. Thus, under the provision, although an individual may be the designated beneficiary of multiple accounts, that individual student may receive a maximum of \$10,000 in distributions each year free of tax.

SR. MARY GLORIA

Dear Sisters and Associates, Co-Workers, Family and Friends,

In the early hours of January 7, just as the Epiphany star departed the heavens, our beloved Sister Mary Gloria Gallagher made her ecstatic flight to God, the cause of her joy and the source of her music-filled heart. Imagine the delight she discovered as, free from all limitations, she found herself in the warmth and glory of God's presence! Surrounded by the song of the heavenly choir, she must have felt immediately at home!

The oldest of four children, Mary Ann was born in Cincinnati, Ohio on November 12, 1924 to parents Elizabeth Mary Phillips and Edward James Gallagher. She described her home as "a very Catholic one" featuring holy water fonts in all the bedrooms and faithful observance of the First Friday rituals. Together with her three sisters, Mary Ann attended St. Clare School, conscientiously applying herself to her academic studies and beginning some preliminary study of the piano. Her contacts with Oldenburg Franciscans continued when she was enrolled at Our Lady of the Angels High School and enhanced her music study of piano and clarinet under the direction of Sister Olivia (LaVerne Frietsch) and Sister Carolyn Bissmeyer. Later, she taught herself to play the flute. For this budding musician, "OLA band and orchestra . . . became my greatest joy."

Following high school graduation, Mary Ann attended Marian College (University) on a scholarship. At first, her intent was to become a research chemist while studying music as a "sideline". But by the end of her sophomore year, Mary Ann reversed these areas of concentration, choosing music as her major. Reflecting on that strategic decision, S. Gloria later stated, "My four years at Marian were some of the happiest of my life, and the friends I made there are still my dearest and closest friends."

With college degree in hand, Mary Ann began teaching piano part-time at Our Lady of Angels High School. In her new-found ministry, Mary Ann drew on those traits derived from her family tradition, blending "her dad's gentleness and her mother's leadership". Meanwhile, she took classes to expand her own musical knowledge at the College of Music in Cincinnati. She obtained certificates for performance in piano and organ, equipping her to begin private piano lessons at her home. In the midst of this activity, she began to realize that she had a vocation to religious life. "In the back of my mind", she reflected, "I knew that the Lord had His hand on my shoulder and that sooner or later He was going to 'pop the question' concerning the plans for the future He had for me." In the summer of 1950 and with the "guiding light" of Sister Carolyn's encouragement, Mary Ann decided to "cast my lot with the Lord" and entered the Oldenburg Franciscan Community on September 8.



Because she entered the Community already prepared with a music degree, S. Gloria was asked to teach part-time at Immaculate Conception Academy (now Oldenburg Academy) while still a postulant. She resumed her teaching as a full-time teacher there for two years before being sent to both OLA and Fenwick High School in Middletown, Ohio. While studying to earn her Master of Music degree from the College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati, S. Gloria became the chair of the music department at OLA and held that position for four years. "Then," she recalled, "in the summer of 1960, a surprise came with a transfer to Oldenburg where I was to chair the Music Department [at ICA], take charge of the Novitiate Choir and serve as the Motherhouse organist. I still remember my prayer as I climbed the choir steps for the first time and prepared myself to meet my first Novitiate Choir!" S. Gloria described the next twenty years at Oldenburg as a wonderful and happy time, a ministry that brought fulfillment and delight. Amid her many duties, she found time to compose the Community's beloved hymn, "The Blessing of St. Clare."

With this characteristic enthusiasm, S. Gloria accepted her next assignment in 1980, teaching "everything in the catalogue" at Marian College (University) and serving as music department head for several years. Even when her ministry moved to part-time in 1994, she continued to enjoy working with young piano and strings students. S. Gloria's energy for music was contagious and motivating. She kept her professional involvements by serving as a member of the Cathedral Choir in Indianapolis, being state chairperson for music performance competitions of the Indiana Music Teachers Association, and by participating in many Community committees.

It was S. Gloria's joy to stay in touch with the many loyal students whose lives she influenced on both the high school and college level. Her uncanny memory for each student's situation and attentiveness to each person continued to endear her to one and all. Even in retirement, S. Gloria enjoyed the deep connections she had made with former students, finding herself the recipient of bountiful visits, letters, and tributes. On the occasion of S. Gloria's 50th anniversary as a Sister, former ICA students surprised her by playing an evening full of her favorite music, an event they named "S. Gloria's Opus". An ICA graduate noted, "You always seemed to be able to find out things we could do best and make us feel good about ourselves." Certainly, these words capture an experience shared by many—S. Gloria's quiet, overflowing love, gently caring about them.

We extend our deepest sympathy to S. Gloria's family, her Sisters and Associates in Community, and the many friends and former students whose lives have been enriched by her gift of both music and love. Now, before the Divine Presence, may she intercede for all of us and carry our songs of praise to our God!

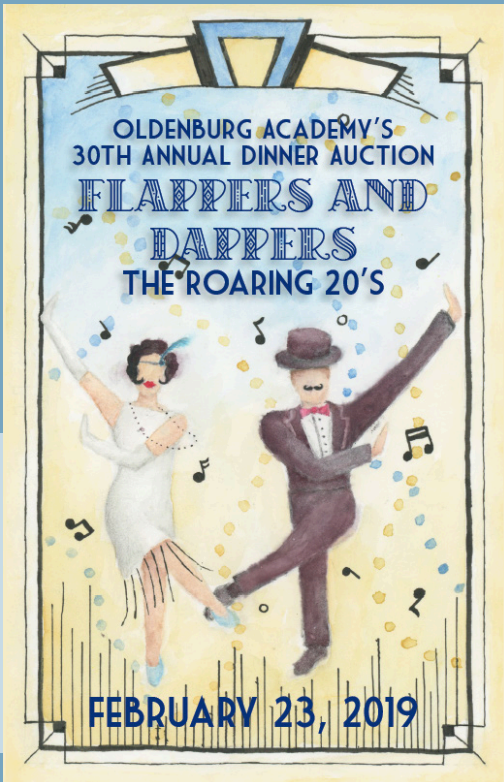

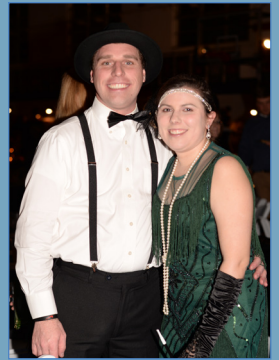
2019 DINNER AUCTION

Over the summer, we plan to:

- Upgrade all existing house lighting in the auditorium to LED
- Add safety floor strip lighting at aisle edges and on the stairs from house to stage
- Replace the current catwalk plug strips
- Replace existing theatrical lighting console with a new system

Olivia Horan '14

I teach kindergarten on the Eastside of Indianapolis at Holy Spirit Catholic School. My students are five and six years old. The majority of my students are Hispanic and they speak both English and Spanish.

I knew I wanted to be a teacher in second grade. I always had an interest in working with children and wanted to pursue a career in something that would leave a positive impact on the future. My education molded me into the person I am today. Because of this, I decided to obtain a degree in Early Childhood Education.

During my years at OA, I knew the teachers and staff truly cared about me. The teachers had strong relationships with parents and families. Those relationships helped prepare me to be a teacher by showing me ways to build rapport with my students and their families. I want my students to feel as loved and cared for as I did when I was at OA.

I don't have a particular favorite story, but my favorite moment is seeing how far my students have grown during this school year. I have students who have started reading books. We began the year by learning the letter names and sounds. It's incredible to see the tools we have learned empower my students to be successful in their foundation of learning. This is my favorite thing about teaching - along with cute stories that they tell me each day! (photo right)

Devon Rosenberger Avery '01

I teach at Hart County High School in Munfordville, Kentucky. It's a rural high school of about 700 students located between Louisville and Nashville. I am a Moderate/ Severe Disabilities teacher for students aged 14-21. I am responsible for all content areas (English, Math, Social Studies, Science) as well as teaching life skills, job skills, and transitions from middle to high school and high school to beyond. I also work with Vocational Rehabilitation to identify students for supported employment or further education and training opportunities.

My son was developmentally delayed as an infant. I had finished a BA in Psychology and was working for community mental health but in his journey of therapies and special education, I decided to pursue a graduate program in special education so I would be better able to help him. I enrolled in an Alternative Route to Teacher Certification

program and finished my Master's in Special Education-Learning and Behavior Disorders with an additional certificate in Moderate/ Severe Disabilities. I also became a National Board Certified Teacher (Exceptional Needs Specialist) about 4 years ago.

I had a solid foundation for my undergraduate as well as graduate coursework, both academically and with critical thinking and problem solving skills. I believe that OA also provided me with a strong sense of social justice, which is exceptionally important in our vocation. Even if I weren't a teacher, I would still be working in a field or volunteer position where I would push for equity and equality.

My students observed the life cycle of the butterfly in our classroom. We had a habitat, made daily observations and notes, and prepared a presentation. They wanted to enter the district wide technology fair as a group, and so I worked to facilitate this. They used technology and assistive devices to discuss their findings and present to the judges. They earned a gold rating for their project and presentation.

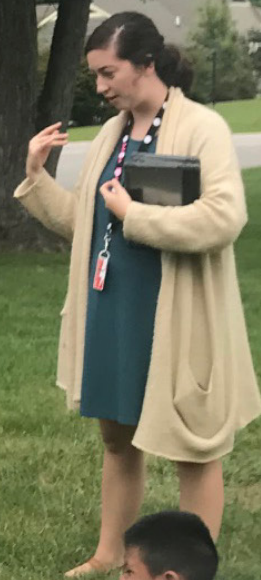

Whenever I think of this young lady, I smile and know that I made a difference with my chosen vocation.

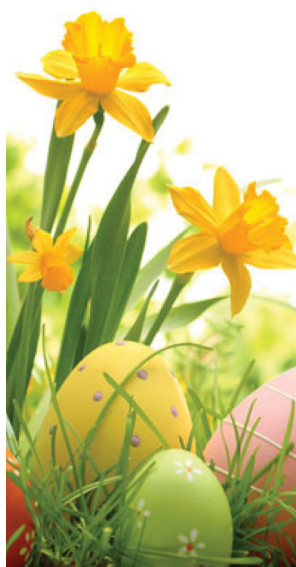
